Olympic talented athlete arrives, they are sent away prompting to a boarding school away from their parents where strict doctrines are taught and followed so creativity can be governed and restricted considerably.

4. Misinformation & Deepfakes

AI-generated content can:

- Create realistic fake videos or audio
- Spread political misinformation
- Manipulate public opinion

Platforms such as Meta and X struggle with regulating AI-driven misinformation.

5. Intellectual Property & Creative Rights

AI models trained on copyrighted works have led to lawsuits involving:

- Authors
- Artists
- Musicians



Some argue AI systems exploit creative labor without compensation.

6. Autonomous Weapons & Military Use

AI in warfare—such as autonomous drones—raises ethical concerns about machines making life-or-death decisions. Organizations like the United Nations have debated regulations on lethal autonomous weapons.

7. Transparency & Accountability

Many AI models are “black boxes,” meaning:

- Their decision-making processes are unclear
- It's difficult to assign responsibility when harm occurs
- Regulation struggles to keep pace with innovation

8. Existential Risk

Some researchers and public figures warn about long-term risks if AI surpasses human control, though experts disagree on how imminent or realistic this threat is.
